

**Christ Church Vestry Minutes 1843-1846 ©**  
the Completion of the Parsonage  
1843 Subscription Lists

Daniel B. Parkinson

This partial transcription of the *1843-1846 Christ Church Rawdon Minute Book* is in **black font**, with explication and comments by the author in **green**. I have summarized content and omitted non-essential formalisms of the day viz. all meetings were opened and closed with a prayer.

**1843**

**Monday, 9 January 1843**

Present: the Rev. Mr. Bourne, J. Eveleigh, T. Scales (church wardens), G. Robinson, W. Copping, J. Lindsay, E Burbidge, David Manchester

Mr. Bourne had contacted Mr. W. (William) Lord.<sup>1</sup>, to put up the frame of the parsonage and to roof and clapboard it and "the work having been completed as was considered by Mr. Lord" it was agreed that the building committee, Mr. Lord and Mr. McPhee and Mr. McPhee should inspect the parsonage at 2 p.m. that day to determine if the terms of the contract were satisfied The whole of Select Vestry and the fore named found no reason to object to the work and agreed it was acceptable.

**Easter Monday, 17 April 1843**

Election of Church Wardens and Vestry. Present: Mr. Bourne, John Eveleigh, George Robinson, David Manchester William Copping, George Harkness, Geo. Copping sen'r., John Nulty, William Cunningham, William Scroggie, James Armstrong, Arthur Hamilton

Elected until East Monday 1844: Church Wardens Henry Smith, Geo. Copping jr.; Select Vestry Dean Burns, Henry Peyton, Henry Copping, William Scroggie, Martin Hobbs, William Scales, Thomas Hamilton, Arthur Hamilton, Henry Pigott

Statement of church accounts by Mr. Bourne: amount collected, including balance in hand on this date £ 7 / 19 / 2 ½. Total £ 20 / 19 / 1 ½ . Paid out c . On hand: £ 0 / 14 / 1 ½.

The Bishop's March 1841 letter (*Vestry Minutes, 1837-1842 fn.2*) and part of his late circular letter were read. A new subscription was started.<sup>A</sup>

**29 June 1843**

Present: Mr. Bourne, Henry Smith, Geo. Copping jr.; Henry Pigott. Henry Copping

Statement of monies on hand from Mr. Bourne, received since Easter Monday £ 2 / 4 / 2. Amount paid 15/ leaving the sum £ 3 / 3 / 3 ½ on hand. **Does not balance.**

Vestry to be provided with subscription lists and member of the Congregation to be called on by them in the ensuing year.

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<sup>1</sup> Lord was from Russelltown, near Huntingdon, Quebec and a Rawdon resident. He married Hannah Dugas, second youngest daughter of Philemon and Patty Dugas, at St. Patrick's Church, Rawdon on 7 November 1846. He was baptized the following day by Mr. Rollit in the Rawdon Anglican Church, and he was buried in Christ Church Cemetery, in 1860. McPhee is not identified, and Dugas was to become Lord's father-in-law.

Mr. Bourne was authorized to draw up a petition on behalf of wardens and vestry, to the Church Society "shortly to assemble at Montreal."

**Tuesday 19 September 1843** at the church

Present: Mr. Bourne, Henry Smith, Geo. Copping jr.; Henry Peyton, Henry Copping, Henry Pigott, Thomas Hamilton, Arthur Hamilton

"Errors and omissions excepted"

A balance of £5 remains due to Mr. Lord, also some 4 or 5 pounds to Major Bagnall and to D. Truesdell<sup>2</sup> whose exact account has not yet been received.

As requested by Wardens and Vestry, Mr. Bourne had presented a petition to the Central Board of the Church Society in Montreal, in July, and a donation for the construction of a parsonage received. A similar petition was left to present to the Montreal Districts Association and "encouragement had been given" that aid would be received from that source, too.

Discussion about expedience of further steps "to advance the New Building and particularly the laying of the foundation & finishing the roof. Resolved "the Stones tossed up in the front of the church should be purchased for the foundation of the new parsonage" and proposals for this work be advertised until Tuesday the 26<sup>th</sup>, and a contract be quickly made "for that purpose." It is interesting that the frame was in place before the foundation. A Committee of Bourne, Peyton, and G. Copping jr. should carry this into effect and the same men take suitable measures "for the finishing of the roof of the New House".

Vestry were "furnished with subscription papers".

**14 November 1843**

Present: Mr. Bourne, Henry Smith, Geo. Copping jr.; Henry Peyton, Henry Copping, Arthur Hamilton, Wm. Scroggie

Mr. Bourne spoke for the committee appointed in September to say John Booth had been employed to perform foundation work for the parsonage and was allowed £ 4 / 10 / 0 plus the additional task of

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<sup>2</sup> Daniel Truesdell was another Dugas son-in-law. He was born in 1805 and baptized (Anglican) at Sorel, Lower Canada, to a late arriving American family. He founded a large family at Rawdon.

walling the cellar for an additional £ 1 / 15 / 0, a deduction was made for his subscription to the church. The job of digging the cellar was given to Charles Haney [sic **Heaney**] for which he was allowed £ 1 / 5 / 0. The finishing of the roof and cornishing [sic **cornicing**] was given to Leveque. These last two jobs not entirely finished. The pile of stones for foundation were purchased by Mr. Jefferies for £ 5. Paid to Mr. Lord £ 5 less £ 4 / 19 / ? donation to the church.

John Booth £ 6 / 15 / ? less subscription £ 5 / 15 / ? amount cut off in photocopying

Charles Haney [sic] £ 1 / 5 / 0

Resolved a collection should be made to provide fuel for the church and vestry contributed as follows **presumably in cords**: H. Smith and W. Scroggie 7 ½ each, H. Copping, G. Copping 6 each, Henry Peyton handed in 6 for John Booth (**they were brothers-in-law**). Mr. Bourne authorized “to employ a man to cut and draw wood for the church”.

Mr. Bourne urged it was necessary for Vestry to remind congregation “to assist him in regard to hay, oats & wood to enable him to pass the winter in the present dwelling – and further to make some improvement upon the house in order to render it more habitable by putting an outside door or lobby in front and rear – the expense to be defrayed out of subscriptions. Vestry consented that he should make the improvements he judged necessary to the amount of a few dollars.<sup>3</sup>

## 1844

### Wednesday, 6 March 1844

Present: Mr. Bourne, Henry Smith, Geo. Copping jr., Messers Peyton, Scroggie, Pigott

Received from Montreal District Assoc. of the Church Society a grant of £ 12 / 10 / ? toward the completion of the parsonage & **not legible**, there were about £ 3 or £ 4 in hand. H. Peyton paid £ 2 / 10 / 0 for subscriptions in his District.

Resolved that plank & boards to finish parsonage be procured as soon as possible “in that they may have to be seasoned for use”. “Mr. Wm. Scroggie was authorized to call on Mr. Bagnall<sup>4</sup> and direct him to proceed without delay to fill up the order given to Major Bagnall, as far as he should be able to furnish the timber agreeably to contract entered into with Major Bagnall.” **The timber was well seasoned because the parsonage is still standing.**

### Wednesday, 2 April 1844 at conclusion of Divine Service

Present were Messers Smith, G. Copping jr., and Scroggie, Peyton, H. Copping

A circular for Bishop of Montreal “requesting information for the Soc. P.G. of statements of the extent and condition of the **illegible** acquired by that body in this mission and the presumed prospective advantages it is capable of affording in way of **illegible & incomprehensible** pasturage etc. etc.” After conversation it was referred to Mr. Bourne’s judgment to answer to his own judgment.<sup>5</sup>

The account of £ 5 due to the Presbyterian Church for stone purchased through Mr. Jefferies for parsonage basement and expedient to be paid by Mr. Bourne. He stated Mr. Jefferies had made a present for the parsonage of 10 pairs of window sashes “formerly proposed to be purchased of him”.

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<sup>3</sup> Both British and American currencies were used. The pound sterling was subdivided into 20 shillings (s), each of 12 pence (d). In Lower Canada, the sou worth a ½ penny was also used. Sterling was official currency until 1858.

<sup>4</sup> William Bagnall was the son of Major Robert Bagnall and operated the family’s businesses.

<sup>5</sup> Mr., Bourne had frequent communication with church authorities answering their queries. Some of this correspondence, from the Diocesan Archives, Bishop’s University, Volume B 19, is on this website at <https://uptorawdon.com/diocesan-archives-bishops-university-volume-b-19/>

Mr. W. Bagnall was authorized to proceed with the “remainder of the timber for the parsonage.”

#### **Easter Monday, 8 April 1844**

Present for the election of church wardens: Mr. Bourne, Messers Pigott, Scroggie, H. Copping, H. Peyton, J. Eveleigh, Jones, J. Smith.

George Robinson to be minister’s warden and Joseph Smith for the congregation until Easter Monday 1845. Other business deferred until “a more general attendance of the members can be attained”.

#### **Thursday, 16 May 1844** after Divine Service

Geo. Harkness sen’r, John Eveleigh, H. Smith, Jos. Smith, G. Robinson, W. Copping, H. Torney, G. Copping jnr., R. Boyce, W. Wade, James Grey, W. Scroggie, J. Burns, W. McGowan

Mr. Bourne read the Church Temporalities Act “which has lately become the law of the Land.”<sup>6</sup> The church wardens were confirmed, and a building committee appointed to work with them: George Copping sen’r., John Burns, John Robinson and Alexander Connolly.

#### **Saturday, 8 June 1844**

Pursuant to notice the Building Committee (George Copping sen’r., John Burns, John Robinson and Alexander Connolly) met with the Church Wardens and Mr. Bourne and are to “take measures without delay to further the finishing of the parsonage”. Mr. Bourne was authorized to advertise for proposals for completing the carpentry work, on Saturday the 15<sup>th</sup> and meeting adjourned to that date at the church at 11 o’clock.

#### **Saturday, 15 June 1844**

To consider proposals for carpentry: Present: Mr. Bourne, George Robinson C.W, G. Copping sen’r, John Burns, John Robinson and Alexander Connolly.

Also, present Joseph Mitchell, John Booth, Pierre Vaillant <sup>7</sup> & Louis Geuvins [sic not identified].

The work was explained at the site with a plan and the particulars. The proposals were Joseph Mitchell £ 35, Louis Geuvins [sic] £ 34, Peter [sic] Vaillant £ 26.

After discussion the committee resolved to accept Mr. Vaillancourt and this contract was entered into  
The whole house to be clapboarded

- 1) Two floors to be laid
- 2) Partitions on the lower floor for 6 apartments incl. the hall (office, hall, parlour, dining room pantry, kitchen)
- 3) Ten paneled doors to be illegible and hung
- 4) Nine windows below (sashes furnished<sup>8</sup>) cased inside and outside

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<sup>6</sup> The Church Temporalities Act, 14-15 Victoria, Chap. 176. An Act to make provision for the management of the Temporalities of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Montreal and for other purposes therein Mentioned. It was proclaimed December 18th. 1852. Mr. Bourne must have read from an outline of what was planned but not yet passed by the government in Quebec.

<sup>7</sup> I believe this is Pierre Vaillant *menuisier* (carpenter) of St-Jacques, husband of Julie Piquet, who baptized children at St-Jacques 1827 – 1839 (some recorded as Voillant ). They married at St-Jacques 26 November 1822. Pierre was literate and signed the register. He was born at l’Assomption 16 February 1789, recorded as Vailland [sic] and possibly, is Pierre Vailland [sic], farmer of Rawdon, who was buried at St-Ambroise, December 1845, aged 53.

<sup>8</sup> Are these the previously mentioned gift of Mr. Jefferies? If so, the question arises, where did he get them and is there a connection to the Burton church and homestead.

- 5) Two closets
- 6) One staircase 7 bannisters
- 7) Panes and casing for 4 windows above

Terms and conditions of the contract.

- 1) the whole of materials to be furnished by the building committee
- 2) payment as follows “at the end of every two weeks. Mr. Vaillant to receive the value of one half the work supposed to be done during that time.” The remainder – “to the amount of two thirds of the whole sum to be made (up) at the time of the finishing of the work and the remaining sum or one third to be paid on the first of January next.”
- 3) “The work to be commenced on or before the 30<sup>th</sup> of this month and the whole to be finished in good substantial and workmanlike manner by the fifteenth day of September next being three months from the present time.”

“For the sum of twenty-six pounds currency. I, Mr. Peter [sic] Vaillant of the Township of Rawdon, do hereby bargain, engage and bind <sup>9</sup> myself to do the above specified work, agreeably to the above specified conditions.”

Signed P. Vaillant

The undersigned were appointed as building committee for the above work and engage to pay Mr. Vaillant, subject to the conditions outlined above. Signed by R. H. Bourne, George Copping sen’r., George Robinson, Alexander Connolly and John Burns. 15 June 1844. The original contract in the hands of R. W. Bourne.

#### **Monday, 24 June 1844** committee meeting

Joseph Smith, John Burns, the Rev. R. W. Bourne (Building Committee) H. Torney, J. Rourke, J. [sic *surely, he means Henry*] Smith (Committee of the Parochial Association).

It was resolved to keep the timber then upon the ground and to give W. Bagnall an additional order for 36 pieces Battons [*sic battens*] for lower floor and 25 pieces 1½ inch plank of upper floor.

#### **26 September 1844**

Building committee: R. H. Bourne, George Copping sen’r., George Robinson, Alexander Connolly and John Burns agreed to accept the work of Mr. Vaillant as done according to agreement “and some additional work was allowed done by him”. Mr. Bourne to take steps to plastering the house.

On the 28<sup>th</sup> of September, John Booth entered into contract to plaster the lower part of the New Parsonage with three coats and in good style for £ 10 / 0 / 0. Mr. Bourne to furnish the nails.

Mr. Bourne considered it advisable to employ the services of a plasterer from Montreal “who continued to labor on the work from the commencement of lathing till the last coat finished - he worked 25 days at 5 / per day & his board during that time he worked on the chimney.

#### **1845**

##### **Easter Monday, 24 March 1845**

Present: Mr. Bourne, G. Harkness, H. Smith, J.H. Pigott, Jos. Smith, J. Armstrong, G. Copping Sen’r., J. Pollock, M. Cook, M. Rourke G. Robinson, I. Grigg, J. Badger, H. Peyton.

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<sup>9</sup> I was reminded of the Prayer of St. Patrick as expressed in the hymn “I bind unto myself today” By his oath and by the committee’s all were bound to do their bounden duty.

The Church Temporalities act was read (see footnote 6.)

Election of Church Wardens: George Robinson and Joseph Smith were reappointed by minister and congregation for the coming year.

Resolved: "a certain number of individuals, not fewer than three nor more than seven be elected annually from the general vestry .... to serve as select vestry for the transaction of business on behalf of the general vestry".

Resolved: that these be appointed as Select Vestry: W. Burns, Jno. Rourke, Richard Boyce, Henry Smith, Jno. Badger, John Sadler and Isaac Grigg.

## 1846

### Easter Monday, 13 April 1846

Present: Mr. Bourne, George Robinson and Joseph Smith, Michael Rourke, John Eveleigh, Henry Joseph Smith, William McGowan. Additional names present: Thos. Scales, Andrew Kerr, Wm. Brown, John McGarrity, Henry Nightingale, James Blair, George Kerr, Robert Kerr, James Connolly.

Election of Church Wardens: George Robinson and Joseph Smith were reappointed by minister and congregation until Easter Monday 1847.
